

Proclamation of Freedom

January 20, 2013

By the President of the United States of America:

A Proclamation.

Whereas, Congress has failed to fulfill its duty to faithfully represent the interests of the American people, and;

Whereas, Congress has passed laws directing the Secretary of the Treasury, through the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, to garnish the wages of American citizens, issue liens and levies against their property, levy fines against them, and imprison them for tax evasion, failure to file income tax returns, pay income taxes, and other violations of the current income tax laws, as recorded in Title 26, Subtitles A and C of the U.S. Code, and;

Whereas, Congress has passed laws directing the Department of Justice to prosecute American citizens for tax evasion, failure to file income tax returns, pay income taxes, and other violations of the current income tax laws, as recorded in Title 26, Subtitles A and C of the U.S. Code, and;

Whereas, the American people have exercised the full power of their vote to restore their freedoms, as granted them in the Constitution of the United States of America;

Now, therefore I, Robert A. McNeil, President of the United States, by virtue of the power in me granted by Article 2, Section 2 of the Constitution of the United States of America, which states "*The President... shall have the power to grant reprieves and pardons for offenses against the United States, except in cases of impeachment*" do, on this twentieth day of January, in the year of our Lord two thousand and thirteen, and in accordance with my purpose to do so publicly, proclaim the following, to wit:

I hereby pardon, and order the immediate release of, all American citizens currently imprisoned for tax evasion, failure to file income tax returns, pay income taxes, and other violations of the current income tax laws, as recorded in Title 26, Subtitles A and C of the U.S. Code, and;

I hereby remove the threat of prosecution of all American citizens for tax evasion, failure to file tax returns, pay taxes, and other violations of the current income tax laws, as recorded in Title 26, Subtitles A and C of the U.S. Code, by directing the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, and all employees of the Internal Revenue Service, to submit letters of resignation from office, and;

I hereby remove the threat of prosecution of all American citizens for tax evasion, failure to file income tax returns, pay income taxes, and other violations of the current income tax laws, as recorded in Title 26, Subtitles A and C of the U.S. Code, by directing the Attorney General, all United States Attorneys, and all Assistant United States Attorneys to submit letters of resignation from office, and;

With the threat of prosecution removed, I hereby direct all American citizens to arrange their finances and use their money to spend, save, invest, and donate to charitable causes, in a manner that results in personal responsibility, self-determination, and freedom from Government interference, in recognition of the unalienable Rights of Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness, as set forth in the Declaration of Independence, and, in accordance with the freedoms granted to them by God, and set forth in the Constitution of the United States of America.

And upon this act, sincerely believed to be an act of compassion and justice, warranted by the Constitution, upon necessity to restore freedom to all American citizens, I invoke the considerate judgment of mankind, and the gracious favor of Almighty God.

In witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington, this twentieth day of January, in the year of our Lord two thousand and thirteen, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred thirty-eighth.
